

The Resurrection of Jesus

A Jewish historian by the name of Josephus who was born around 37 A.D. and died sometime after 100 A.D. mentioned as well the resurrection of Jesus. He wrote in his book “The Antiquities of the Jews” the following; “Now, there was about this time, Jesus, a wise man, if it be lawful to call him a man, for he was a doer of wonderful works, a teacher of such men as receive the truth with pleasure. He drew over to him both many of the Jews, and many of the Gentiles. He was the Christ; and when Pilate, at the suggestion of the principal men amongst us, had condemned him to the cross, those that loved him at the first did not forsake him, for he appeared to them alive again the third day, as the divine prophets had foretold these and ten thousand other wonderful things concerning him; and the tribe of Christians, so named from him are not extinct at this day.”

The resurrection of Jesus Christ was the greatest event and the most powerful that man has ever witnessed. This is why the first-hand eyewitnesses dedicated themselves to tell the world about Jesus.

Even though the world itself did not like the Gospel message of the resurrection, the witnesses continued day in and day out to preach it, even though it cost them their life.
